alking towards
Strandloper's
renowned Leeto
Restaurant,
your breath is
literally knocked out of you. In front
of the hotel stretches nearly 9km of
pristine beach, lapped by a sparkling
sea and laced with seagulls mewling
and diving in the extraordinary light
that everybody talks about. And
what they say is true: it's the kind
of light that artists abandon happy
homes to seek out.

Strandloper often uses the phrase 'barefoot luxury', and that's exactly how it feels: the fact that there are so few rooms and such a tight team makes it seem intimate yet at the same time you feel very spoilt; it's a wonderful, unusual balance.

Our sea-view suite felt absolutely private yet showcased a sweeping view of the bay. At our first breakfast, I saw a guest in intense conversation with the general manager, Abraham Mouton. They paced up and down the beach, finally seeming to settle on a spot. The next morning, luxurious loungers, umbrellas, fresh flowers and bubbly had been set up in the chosen spot, ready for the guest to propose to his girlfriend. (She accepted, of course!)



had been to Babylonstoren before, strolling through the gardens and eating lunch at the Greenhouse, but

I had barely scratched the surface. The first thing that tipped me off was the wine tasting at the end of our cellar tour. Each of the 10 Babylonstoren wines was paired with a complementary snack: macadamias (from the farm) to go with the crisp Sprankel MCC, lemon-zested buffalo mozzarella (from the farm) to go with the oaked Chardonnay, charcuterie and biltong (from the

farm) to go with the reds... I'm sensing a theme here.

Our evening drive to the Clouds, a lookout point with glorious views of the farm, as well as the next day's garden tour, confirmed my suspicions: there's very little that

doesn't grow on this farm. The 3,5-hectare garden lies at the heart of Babylonstoren. Besides the plum and citrus fruits grown for export, they also cultivate olives for olive oil, table grapes, figs, prickly pears, persimmons, custard apples, guavas, almonds, pecans, macadamias, cacao pods, rooibos tea, wheat for their bread... the list goes on.

Our dinner at the flagship restaurant Babel ended with the BitterSweet dessert: chocolate and cardamom delice with mampoermarinated satsumas. Back in our glass-fronted cottage, we cracked open a bottle of Shiraz to enjoy by the fire. Besides the obvious luxuries – the plush four-poster king-size bed, the bath made for soaking and the fully kitted-out kitchen, there are personal touches everywhere, like fresh cold-pressed juices in the larder.

Armed with a few bottles of that Shiraz, jars of preserves and oudhscented soap from the Scented Room, we gave the donkeys out front a pat goodbye and vowed to return soon.
